Understanding Islam, a five-part series designed to explore the rich cultural heritage offered by this faith tradition, and make us conscious of the challenges our Muslim brothers and sisters face in this country and beyond (May 3, 10, 15, 17 & 29) will be offered by the York Diversity Forum along with the York High School Civil Rights Team. First up on Saturday, May 3, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., *What is Islam?* Bates anthropologist Heather Lindkvist

will give a presentation on the basic tenants of Islam and the Koran. Since 2001, she has conducted ethnographic fieldwork among the Muslim community in Lewiston. She is also a member of an interdisciplinary research group conducting a comparative study of Islam in the United States. Discussion will follow. Samples of foods from Islamic culture and tradition will be available at all programs. All five sessions in the series will be held at the York Public Library and admission is free.
